Day 1: Xandari Costa Rica, Alajuela (Mon, 23 December)

Alajuela

Situated in vibrant Costa Rica, the large city of Alajuela serves as the capital of the Alajuela Province. It is known for its rich history, laid-back charm and provides an excellent base from which to explore the countryside to the north. This city's biggest claim to fame is that it is the hometown of one of the country's most famous national heroes, Juan Santamaria, a humble drummer boy who sacrificed his life at the Battle of Santa Rosa. Visitors can look forward to exploring Parque Central, a lush oasis in the heart of the city; browsing the massive Central Market, which stretches over an entire block; or visiting the Juan Santamaria Cultural Historical Museum, to learn about local history and view an array of historical artefacts. Don't miss the opportunity to sample authentic Costa Rican cuisine at one of the many restaurants and cafes lining the bustling streets.

Day Itinerary

Upon your arrival in San José, Costa Rica and after passing through immigration you will be met by a member of the National Chamber of Tourism (CANATUR) who will give you a sticker that will facilitate our representative to identify you after exit the Airport building.

As you exit the airport you will be met and transferred to your hotel. Your driver will provide you with the travel vouchers for your services and review them with you at this time.

Overnight: Xandari Costa Rica

Xandari Costa Rica is nestled on a 40-acre plantation, surrounded by lush gardens, and with terraces offering spectacular views of Costa Rica's majestic Central Valley. Accommodation includes 24 villas categorised as prima villas, prima plus villas, ultra villas, ultra plus villas and star villas.

Day 2: Casa Corcovado Jungle Lodge, Corcovado National Park (Tue, 24 December)

Corcovado National Park

Its myriad exotic creatures include jaguars, ocelots, tapirs, red macaws, quetzals and red-eyed tree frogs – not to mention the dolphins and humpback whales that breed in the coastal waters. Nature and adventure lovers will be in their element here, with a host of outdoor activities on offer, including wildlife viewing, fishing, surfing, and jungle treks.

Day Itinerary

You will be picked up at your hotel by one of our transport representatives for transfer to the Local Terminal at the San Jose Airport.

Local airline flight from San Jose to Palmar Sur. Check in 1 hour prior to flight departure time, approximately 50 minutes.

You will be picked up at the airstrip in Palmar Sur by a representative from your hotel for land transfer to the Sierpe River, approximately 30 minutes. Once at the River board a motor boat to Drake Bay, approximately 1 hour and 30 minutes. The boat ride through the Sierpe River will take you through mangrove forests to admire the flora and fauna of this unique ecosystem. Drake Bay offers visitors a taste of a tropical wilderness along the coast and into the forests of nearby Corcovado National Park.

Bring: water shoes, sunscreen and protective sun gear, camera, insect repellent, a light rain jacket, bathing suit, hat, sunglasses, waterproof camera bag, prescription medicine.

Please be prepared for a wet landing upon arrival at the Lodge.

Casa Corcovado Jungle Lodge is located in a tropical garden surrounded by pristine rainforest on the edge of the Corcovado National Park. Accommodation is available in a selection of suites and bungalows which feature modern amenities including electricity, ceiling fans, hot water, and a safety deposit box. Guests may enjoy delicious meals at the

in-house restaurant which specialises in traditional Costa Rican cuisine. The outdoor bar serves a variety of non-alcoholic beverages and features a stunning view of the rainforest. The lodge also features a secluded spring-fed swimming pool which is surrounded by jungle.

Corcovado National Park has often been described as one of the most biologically intense places on earth. The park extends over 100,000 acres on the southwest coast of Costa Rica.

Your guided walk will bring you into a wonderland of ancient, steamy forests dominated by huge trees, home to much wildlife including scarlet macaws, toucans, parrots, all four monkey species found in the country and jaguars-although these elusive cats are rarely seen.

Bring: water, light clothing, hiking shoes, repellent, camera, binoculars, sunscreen, umbrella. Includes: entrance fee and local guide.

Day 4: Casa Corcovado Jungle Lodge, Corcovado National Park (Thu, 26 December)

Day Itinerary

Caño Island was once an important ceremonial site and burial ground for the pre-Colombian Indians. Its possible they abandoned the area when pirates began arriving - the first, according to legend, being Sir Francis Drake back in 1579. The island is now a National Park.

Your tour starts after a leisurely breakfast, when you will meet your guide at the Gear House to select your flippers and mask. Its then a 40-minute boat ride to Caño Island. At certain times of the year, you may also see pilotor humpback whales, and dolphin along the way. The snorkeling site is located within a marine reserve, and is a good place for spotting a wide variety of fish and marine mammals, including - if you are lucky - manta rays, turtles and small white-tipped sharks.

There are no facilities, and visitor access to the interior is prohibited while important infrastructure work is carried out. However our boat can take you close to the shore and you are welcome to wade ashore and stroll along the beach.

Bring: Water shoes, sunblock lotion, light clothing, light jacket, hat or bandana and swimsuit.

Day 5: Chayote Lodge, Naranjo (Fri, 27 December)

Naranjo

Naranjo is a tiny agricultural town resting at the base of the Espírito Santo Hills in Costa Rica's lush Central Valley. With more than two hundred years of coffee cultivation under its belt, the town has become a coffee lovers' mecca with ever increasing numbers of visitors touring the area's coffee plantations, sampling some in the finest coffees of the world, and learning about the local brew. Other popular activities in the area include discovering the lush tropical landscape via a canopy tour or a jungle hike. Don't miss the chance to explore the nearby Juan Castro Blanco National Park which is known for its orchid flowers and quetzal birds, as well as the Poás Volcano National Park which features a remarkable crater lake filled with smoke billowing from fumaroles.

Day Itinerary

You will be picked up by a representative from your hotel. Board a motor boat from Drake Bay to the main port of the Sierpe River, approximately 1 hour and 30 minute transfer. The boat ride through the Sierpe River will take you through mangrove forests to admire the flora and fauna. At the port of the Sierpe River you will take a land transfer to the Palmar Sur airstrip, approximately 30 minutes.

Please be prepared for a wet take of when departing the Lodge.

Local airline flight from Palmar Sur to San Jose. Check in 1 hour prior to flight departure time, approximately 50 minutes.

Pick up at the Local Terminal in San José for a private 1 hour overland transfer, plus any stops along the way, to your hotel in Llano Bonito de Alajuela.

Day 6: Chayote Lodge, Naranjo (Sat, 28 December)

Day Itinerary

Naranjo is small town sheltering some of Costa Rica best coffee plantations. Over two hundred years of coffee cultivation, have marked Naranjo as a mecca in the production of some of the finest coffees of the world, achieving several world awards for its quality.

Our first stop will be at the Espiritu Santo Coffee Tour; during hour and a half we will learn all the secrets of why this famous drink has taken the world over. We will be able to learn about all phases of the coffee, from the seed to the cup.

The visit takes place in farm own by the local cooperative of coffee growers, where a coffee landscaping of rolling hills make a unique scenery. After our coffee tour, we will continue to the Municipal Market, where vegetables, fruits, meats and other produce is for sale for the local inhabitants to buy always fresh produce. Our guide will tell us about the different fruits and explain how they are used in local homes. We will have lunch in one the eateries of the market. After

lunch we will visit the local church, the Basilica of the Lady of Piedades, rebuilt after several earthquakes in the 1940s.

Bring: bug repellent, sun block lotion, light clothing, hiking shoes, raincoat, camera and hat.

Consultant Notes

A terrace café just outside the main dining room is the perfect setting for an 'alfresco' breakfast, lunch or afternoon coffee.

Our coffee culture is the principal motivation for the design and decoration. The hand painted lamps in the welcome corridor represent the five stages of the coffee bean. Coffee sticks decorate part of the ceiling, and the "cajuelas" or metal measuring tools used daily in the coffee fields to ration the coffee picked by farmers are used in the bar to decorate and exhibit our liquor bottles.

You will only savor natural fresh food prepared with locally grown produce and some even in our own gardens. Our menu changes according to seasonal vegetables and fruits. We are proud to rescue the best of our Costa Rican cuisine and present it as part of your experience in the lodge.

Quelites Restaurant is very popular among locals. Feel free to make new friends and learn firsthand why Costa Rican's claim to be the happiest people in the world.

Day 7: Senda Monteverde, Monteverde Cloud Forest Reserve (Sun, 29 December)

Monteverde Cloud Forest Reserve

Known as the 'Forest in the Clouds', Monteverde is one of Costa Rica's key conservation areas, taking in six different ecological zones and home to a kaleidoscopic array of flora and fauna. Breathtaking walking trails traverse this mountainous reserve, while a network of canopy bridges are suspended in the tree tops overhead – both offering visitors the chance to experience its astonishing biodiversity. The park's menagerie of exotic wildlife includes jaguars, ocelots, three-wattled bell birds, bare-necked umbrella birds, and elusive, vividly coloured quetzals, while its botanical offerings range from woodlands and rainforests, to exquisite orchids, delicate ferns, jungle vines and mosses.

Day Itinerary

Today you will be transferred to your next destination: Monteverde.

Monteverde is more rural village than town, although it does offer some conveniences. Your best bet for services such as gas is to stop in nearby Santa Elena, which offers a bank, pharmacy, restaurants and Internet cafes.

The Monteverde area has several dairy farms, which produce some delicious cheeses.

The dairy farms were established by Quakers who migrated from the U.S. to Costa Rica to avoid the WW II draft. The Quakers were instrumental in developing Monteverde and preserving the cloud forest.

Overnight: Senda Monteverde

Senda Monteverde is located in the beautiful town of Monteverde in Costa Rica. The hotel offers 28 guest rooms and suites with open-air porches overlooking the lush gardens. Guests can explore the mystical Cloud Forest, learn about the local Quaker culture as well as walk through the area's famous Farmer's Market. The hotel also offers luxury amenities, gorgeous local artworks and playful nooks to relax in.

The Selvatura Canopy and Walkways Tour in Monteverde are a zip line adventure ride and treetop canopy bridge walk respectively. The zip line canopy tour is an exhilarating ride through the tree tops where you are suspended by a harness and glide on 15 cables. Between cables you rest on platforms constructed among the trees which offer panoramic views.

On the Walkways Tour you hike along a 1.7 mile cloud forest trail and suspension bridges through and above the tree tops.

Travel Information



Visitors to the Republic of Costa Rica will find that despite its small size, the country has an incredible number of attractions and activities to offer. Five per cent of the world's biodiversity can be found within Costa Rica's borders and great efforts have been made to preserve this rich resource; protected national parks make up almost 25% of the land — more than any other country in the world. From fishing and surfing to white water rafting and exploring volcanic regions, Costa Rica is the perfect playground for nature lovers and adventures seekers alike.

Banking and Currency

Currency

Costa Rican Colón (CRC; symbol (0)) = 100 céntimos. Notes are in denominations of (0,000, 20,000, 10,000, 5,000, 2,000) and 1,000. Coins are in denominations of (0,000, 20,000, 20,000, 20,000, 20,000) and 1,000. Coins are in denominations of (0,000, 20,0

The import and export of local and foreign currency is limited to US\$10,000. Amounts above this must be declared upon arrival.

Currency exchange facilities are available at banks and bureaux de change. Some hotels may also change money. Additionally, small stores will allow visitors to pay for goods in US dollars (small notes US\$20.00, US\$10.00) and receive change in colones. We highly advice not to exchange currency at the airports bureaux de change, they always give you a very low exchange rate, try to use always banks or hotel cashiers.

Banking

Banking hours: State banks Mon-Fri 09h00-15h00. Private banks Mon-Fri 08h00-16h00.

Diners Club, MasterCard and Visa credit cards are all accepted; American Express slightly less so. Many banks will only process MasterCard for cash credits. Cash may be the only form of payment in smaller towns and rural areas but many places will take US dollars, giving change in colones.

ATMs are common throughout the cities and small towns. They will usually accept foreign cards but in some regions only Visa cards are accepted. Occasionally, paying with credit cards may not be possible for technical reasons. Bringing a good supply of US dollars in cash is advised, as many things such as entrance fees to national parks or meals at restaurants, can be paid for with US dollars.

Although travellers can avoid additional exchange rate charges by taking traveller's cheques in US dollars, fewer and fewer businesses in Costa Rica are willing to accept them, and it is better to use the ATM.

Travel, Transport and Getting Around

SANSA (www.flysansa.com) operates services between San José and provincial towns and tourist resorts, including Tortuguero, Tamarindo, Quepos and Golfito. A number of companies also provide internal charter flights using different plane sizes. Much of Costa Rica is riddled with challenging roads, so if you can afford to fly then it will make your life a lot more comfortable.

Costa Ricans drive on the right side of the road. The quality of the roads in Costa Rica is, for the most part, not great. Stretches of the Pan-American Highway leading to and from the major cities tend to be okay, but the rest is a mix of dust, gravel, potholes and perilously mountainous roads. Be very careful driving – especially if you're in a hired car and want to get your deposit back – and if you're a nervous driver then consider public transport instead. You must be over 21 to hire a car, and though an international driver's license is safest, you are likely to be able to use a full license from your own country. You will need a credit card for the deposit, which will cost at least as much as the car hire but which you will hopefully get back.

There are many different car hire companies in Costa Rica, predominantly in San José and at the main airport, but it is advisable to either book a car through a local travel agency or to be exceptionally careful to note and confirm any damage or scratches to the vehicle before you drive off. Also ensure that the vehicle comes with a spare tyre – a decent one! – and a jack, because Costa Rica's roads are such that you may well need one.

A speed limit of 80kph (55mph) is enforced on most highways. However, Costa Ricans are notoriously dangerous drivers who pay little heed to speed limits and traffic regulations. Be careful going through towns, as the speed limit drops. If you speed or drink drive the Costa Rican police can fine you heavily, so it is suggested that you don't do anything to antagonise them and, if you are pulled over, be extremely nice. Never try and bribe them. Use of seat belts is mandatory.

Taxis are numerous and inexpensive in San José. The taxis are coloured red (except those serving the Juan Santamaría International Airport, which are orange). Taxis are usually metered, but few drivers use the meters as they figure they can extract more money from tourists by not doing so. Make sure they put it on and that it hasn't already been running, or ask your hotel concierge how much a fare should be, and negotiate with the driver to an agreed amount before setting off.

Public transport via road in Costa Rica ranges from the large coach companies such as the Tica Bus (www.ticabus.com) and Transnica (506 2223 4242; http://transnica.com), which are comfortable and air-conditioned, to tiny little shuttle buses in the Nicoya Peninsula, where they pack you in and jolt you around for hours. Bus travel, however long and potentially frustrating, is inexpensive and often quite fun.

Train lines are now limited to two commuter routes: from Heredia to San José, travelling only at peak times and taking half an hour; and from Pavas via San José and San Pedro to Curridabat, running only hourly in the morning and evening.

Food, Drink and Cuisine Advice

Costa Rica is a not a major foodie destination, but what it lacks in sophistication it makes up for in choice.

The Caribbean coast tends to be more influenced by the island nations. Jamaican-style jerk chicken is a staple; rice and beans (gallo pinto) are ubiquitous, but more likely to be prepared with coconut milk; and curry spices feature heavily as ingredients, creating dishes with a very distinct flavour from their counterparts on the Pacific coast.

The Costa Rican diet is fairly healthy with low use of dairy or high-fat dishes. Fresh fruits and vegetables make up a high proportion of meals, while pork, chicken and beef are the most popular meats. Seafood is available throughout the country, particularly in coastal regions, with sea bass being the most common fish on menus.

Mains water is normally heavily chlorinated and, whilst relatively safe to drink, may cause mild abdominal upsets. Drinking water outside main cities and towns may be contaminated and sterilisation is advisable. Bottled water is available and is advised for the duration of the stay, especially for those who are liable to sensitive stomachs. Milk is pasteurised and dairy products are safe for consumption. Local meat, poultry, seafood, fruit and vegetables are generally considered safe to eat.

Climate and Weather

In the Central Valley, where the main centres of population are located, the average temperature is 22°C (72°F) and the region enjoys a spring-like climate year round. In the coastal areas, the temperature is much hotter and humid, while the Pacific Northwest can be extremely hot and dry. The rainy season starts in May and finishes in November, although there are distinct regional variations. June and July are the wettest months, particularly on the Caribbean side, but the season can run from May until December. The 'warm' dry season is December to May, though temperature differences between summer and winter are slight. March is the height of the dry season, and the humidity is lower at this time, making this a popular time for visitors.

Clothing and Dress Recommendations

Lightweight cotton and linen clothing is recommended for most of the year with warmer clothes for cooler evenings. Waterproofing is necessary during the rainy season. Loose-fitting clothing is best. Wear neutral browns and greens for birding and wildlife viewing. Always bring mosquito repellent for both day and night.

Electricity and Plug Standards

Electric sockets in the Republic of Costa Rica are Type B (NEMA 5-15) and/or Type A (NEMA 1-15). If your appliance's plug doesn't match the shape of these sockets, you will need a travel plug adapter in order to plug in. Travel plug adapters simply change the shape of your appliance's plug to match whatever type of socket you need to plug into. If it's crucial to be able to plug in no matter what, bring an adapter for all three types.

Electrical sockets supply electricity at 120 volts AC / 60 Hz frequency. If you're plugging in an appliance that was built for 220-240 volt electrical input, or an appliance that is compatible with multiple voltages, then an adapter is all you need. If your appliance isn't compatible with 120 volts, a voltage converter will be necessary.
